

Jamaican Murder **Suspect Captured** in Turks and Caicos After Illegal Entry

Providenciales, TCI — May 12, 2025

A Jamaican man wanted in his home country for a serious crime has been apprehended in the Turks and Caicos Islands after entering the territory illegally.

Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force (RT&CIPF), 31-year-old Alex Anthony McDonald, a Jamaican national, was spotted on Saturday, May 10, at Sapodilla Beach in the Chalk Sound area of Providenciales.

Acting swiftly on the tip, officers from the Tactical Unit moved in and arrested McDonald. Authorities later confirmed that he had illegally entered the TCI, and he has since been charged by the Criminal Investigations Department (CID) with Unlawful Entry.

local detectives revealed that McDonald is wanted by the

CCORDING to the Royal Jamaica Constabulary Force (JCF) in connection with an ongoing murder investigation.

Investigations remain ongoing, and the RT&CIPF has confirmed that it is working closely with regional law enforcement partners and Interpol to determine McDonald's full criminal background and any potential links to crimes within the TCI.

The police are urging the public to report any information related to illegal activity. Tips can be shared anonymously by calling 911, the Serious Crime Unit at 231-1842, or Crime Stoppers at 1-800-8477. The Further intelligence gathered public is also encouraged to download and use the Crime Stoppers P3 app to share information securely.

Governor Dismisses Al-Generated Rumours of UK Inquiry into TCI Governance

Providenciales, TCI – Wednesday, 7 May 2025 — Governor Dileeni Daniel-Selvaratnam has strongly denied social media claims that a United Kingdom-led inquiry into governance in the Turks and Caicos Islands (TCI) is underway, describing the circulating information as both false and artificially generated.

N an official statement, the Governor's Office confirmed there is no UK inquiry related to governance issues in the territory, and emphasized the importance of relying on verified information.

"The information in question appears to be Al-generated from past media articles," the statement read. "We advise relying only on official communications for accurate updates."

The false reports, widely shared on social media platforms, suggested that the UK would deploy investigators and law enforcement officials to the TCl and other Overseas Territories beginning in June 2025. The fabricated claims pointed to alleged corruption and governance failures as justification for the supposed intervention.



The rumour triggered alarm among residents, with some interpreting the post as a sign of impending foreign control or a heavy-handed British presence in the territory.

Governor Selvaratnam moved quickly to allay public fears, calling for calm and urging citizens to exercise discernment when engaging with unverified online content

"There is no inquiry. There is no deployment. There is no crisis," an official close to the Governor's Office added.

This incident underscores the growing challenge posed by Al-generated

misinformation, particularly in small jurisdictions like the TCI where social media can rapidly amplify unverified claims.

Officials reminded the public that any major developments involving UK-TCI relations would be formally announced through official government or Governor's Office channels.

As of now, no investigation has been launched, and governance in the Turks and Caicos Islands remains a matter of local oversight and partnership with the UK in line with existing constitutional arrangements

Elite Fast Rope Training for Members of the Royal TCI Police Force

This rigorous, high-level training was conducted in Exuma, Bahamas, and facilitated by the United States Drug Enforcement Administration (Tactical Helicopter Section).

Participants received hands-on instruction and real-world practice in executing rapid helicopter insertions— an essential skill for missions in environments where aircraft cannot safely land.

Fast rope training is a specialized







military and tactical technique that allows personnel to quickly descend from a hovering helicopter using a thick rope—without the use of a harness. Commonly used by elite tactical units worldwide, this method is crucial in high-stakes, time-sensitive operations such as counter-narcotics, search and rescue, and critical incident responses.

Barbados Gears Up for the CARPHA 69th Health **Research Conference**

Bridgetown, Barbados. 5 May 2025. Barbados is set to host the highly anticipated 69th CARPHA Health Research Conference from 7th to 9th May at the Lloyd Erskine Sandiford Centre. The conference is hosted in collaboration with the Barbados Ministry of Health

This year, under the theme "Mental Health: The Hidden Pandemic" the conference will present focused sessions on mental health, non-communicable diseases, family health, as well as infectious diseases,

A panel discussion titled Breaking the Stigma: Advancing Mental Health Care for Children, Adolescents and Young Adults in the Caribbean on Day 1 will explore urgent strategies for improving the detection and treatment of mental health issues among children, adolescents, and young adults in the Caribbean. Panellists will examine the cultural stigmas, systemic gaps, and resource limitations that hinder early diagnosis and access to care.

In addition to a Special Session on Pandemic Fund and Infectious Diseases, the conference will present focused sessions on non-communicable diseases, family health, mental health, vector borne diseases, and nutrition.

A total of 87 oral papers and 86 poster presentations will highlight research findings from students, academics, and health professionals from the Caribbean region and internationally.

Local, regional and international companies and organisations will display their products and services, innovations and programmes.

"Last year, in Saint Lucia the conference drew 300 attendees, and this year an estimated 400 attendees is anticipated. This reflects the growing interest in the conference which aims to address pressing health challenges and seek actionable solutions. The combination of side meetings, oral and poster presentations, networking sessions and dialogue underscores the importance of public health research to the Caribbean," stated Dr Lisa Indar, Executive Director of CARPHA.

The 2025 health research conference promises to be an event that fosters collaboration and encourages research to action.

Bogus Windfall: Government Warns of \$42K Scam Masquerading as Official Program

NASSAU, sophisticated online promising scam over \$42,000 in government-issued payments triggered alarm The Bahamas, prompting a swift and stern warning from the Ministry of Economic Affairs. The elaborate hoax,

now pulled from the internet, featured a fake Q&A-style interview with Minister Michael Halkitis - complete with doctored quotes, government-like branding, and the logo of a major national newspaper.

At the heart of the scam was a too-good-to-be-true offer: a special financial program allegedly reserved for 4,000 Bahamians, each set to receive \$3,500 BSD monthly. The phony article, disguised as a legitimate news piece, falsely claimed the initiative had government backing and featured a fabricated interview in which Minister Halkitis appeared to endorse the program

In a press statement issued May 13, Minister Halkitis categorically denied any involvement and called the website "very likely a website created with malicious

Haiti in Crisis: Children and Families Caught in the Crossfire of Gang Violence

Haiti is facing an escalating humanitarian catastrophe as gang violence continues to spread across the country, forcing tens of thousands to flee and placing children at immense risk. According to the United Nations, a recent spike in armed conflict in the Lower Artibonite and Centre Departments has displaced over 66,000 people in less than two weeks — including at least 15,000 children. The displaced now seek shelter in overcrowded rural zones or makeshift sites, where access to clean water, food, and basic healthcare is dangerously

ETWEEN April 28 and May 3 alone, over 16,000 people fled their homes in Lower Artibonite, with families living in precarious conditions and reliant on emergency aid. The UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) is leading coordination efforts to support national authorities in addressing priority needs. In response, UNICEF has deployed mobile clinics, delivering essential pediatric care and immunization services to nearly 2,000 people. Hygiene kits and nutritional support are also being distributed to prevent further deterioration of health conditions in displacement sites.

The situation for children is especially dire. Many are being exposed to or directly affected by violence, including forced recruitment into armed groups, sexual violence, and family separation. UNICEF and its partners are responding by establishing child-friendly spaces

more than 1.400 children. Specialized case management is underway, with at least 150 high-risk cases referred to protection services.

Despite these efforts, humanitarian needs far exceed current funding. The 2025 Humanitarian Needs and Response Plan identifies over \$44 million needed for child protection alone. Yet, to date. only about \$68 million of the total \$908 million required for the entire country has been secured—just 7 percent of the target. As Haiti braces for the approaching hurricane season, the urgent call for international support has never been more critical.

Haiti's complex crisis—driven by gang control, political instability, and chronic underdevelopment-demands sustained global attention. Without swift, coordinated action, an entire generation risks being lost to violence, displacement, and neglect.

Carnival Corporation's AIDA Cruises Showcases **Environmentally Sustainable Operations to** Caribbean Disaster Management Agency

BARBADOS (May 14, The Caribbean Disaster Emergency Management Agency (CDEMA) gained valuable insights into sustainable cruise operations during a visit on board AIDAbella in Barbados, as AIDA Cruises' Caribbean season comes to a close. AIDA Cruises, a Carnival Corporation & plc brand, welcomed CDEMA officials aboard to demonstrate the ship's advanced environmental management and waste reduction systems.

AIDAbella's Environmental Officer, Sebastian Treue, provided comprehensive briefing of liquefied natural gas (LNG) power systems on some of AIDA's ships, highlighting that the cruise line was the first in the industry to introduce a fully LNG-powered cruise ship in 2018 and has continued this standard with newer, much larger vessels such as AIDAcosma.

"This engagement with CDEMA represents an important opportunity for knowledge sharing between the cruise industry and regional experts," said Sebastian Treue, Environmental Officer from AIDAbella. "As we operate throughout the Caribbean, maintaining strong relationships with organizations like CDEMA is essential to our commitment to responsible tourism and regional



The visit also showcased AIDA's significant reduction of single-use plastics by over 77% since 2018, advanced wastewater treatment systems and a sophisticated waste management program designed to minimize impact with environmental processing and disposal. AIDA's waste reduction actions also include using a color-coded system that sorts waste into 21 categories for environmentally responsible handling.

CDEMA, headquartered in Barbados serves as the regional intergovernmental agency for disaster management in the Caribbean Community (CARICOM). The agency coordinates emergency response and relief efforts across 20 participating states, 15 of which are destinations for Carnival Corporation's cruise lines.

By offering a firsthand look at environmental systems to regional agencies like CDEMA, Carnival Corporation reinforces its commitment to building strong relationships throughout the Caribbean, where its cruise lines including AIDA Cruises operate as responsible tourism partners.



Commissioner Bailey Delivers Presentation in Guyana at Caribbean Commissioners AGM

The 39th Annual General Meeting (AGM) and Conference of the Association of Caribbean Commissioners of Police (ACCP) officially commenced on Monday at the Arthur Chung Conference Centre in Guyana, under the theme "United Against Crime."

OSTED by Commissioner of Police Mr. Clifton Hicken of the Guyana Police Force, the conference has drawn participation from over 24 Commissioners of Police and their delegations from across the Caribbean region.

Commissioner of Police Fitz Bailey, titled "Regional Response to Stymie the Tentacles of Organized Crimes:

Commissioner Bailey underscored the growing threat posed by organized crime transnational (TOC) networks operating across the Caribbean with alarming ease. He identified a spectrum of illicit activities—drug trafficking, human and migrant smuggling, money laundering, environmental crimes, cybercrime, and illicit firearms trafficking—that are conducted with relative impunity due to porous borders and limited regional coordination.

Commissioner Bailey stressed the urgent need for a unified regional strategy, stating that "criminals operate with no respect for judicial boundaries," and called on operate member states to adopt a collective approach to combat these threats. Commissioner Bailey also addressed the types and calibers of weapons

concealment, and the critical need for tighter regulation and accountability within courier services.

In his concluding remarks, the top cop urged member nations to support the implementation of coordinated regional roadmaps, strengthen capacities for detection, investigation, and prosecution, launch joint operations in collaboration partners such as INTERPOL.

He also called for establishment of evidence-based monitoring systems to track arms trafficking more effectively.

Following the arrest of a suspect in the Five Cays area on Thursday, May 1, 2025, the Serious Crime Unit of the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force (RT&CIPF) has formally charged a 30-year-old male in connection with two separate murders that occurred in 2023 and 2024. RHASHAD MCKENZIE, of Five Cays, has been charged with two counts of murder.

The charges relate to the deaths

of ERVIN GLINTON and GUILENE JEAN BAPTISTE. McKenzie appeared in Court yesterday (May 8th) and was remanded to H.M. Prison-Home of the Department of Correction and Rehabilitation, pending a Sufficiency Hearing on July 4, 2025, at the Supreme Court. The accused was charged following consultation with the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP).

Baptiste, 26, of Dock Yard, was shot

and killed on August 2, 2023. Glinton, 22, of Sand Bar Street, Five Cays, was fatally shot on January 24, 2024.

At the time, officers had responded to reports of gunshots on Reece Street, Five Cays. Upon arrival, Glinton's body was discovered. On March 03, 2025, investigators arrested GEORGE THOMAS ARTHUR Jr. of Reece Street following a police



Prosecutors revealed Combs used aliases like "Frank White" and "Frank Black" when booking hotel rooms for these encounters in the territory.

Ventura described being physically and sexually abused, forced to find escorts—sometimes via Craigslist—and comply with rigid demands, including specific lighting, clothing, and even nail polish. She said Combs often recorded the events and threatened to release the footage if she disobeyed him. "I felt disgusting and

humiliated," she said, recalling one instance where escorts urinated on her at Combs' direction.

The most disturbing moment came when jurors were shown still images from the freak offs. Many appeared visibly stunned.

A now-infamous 2016 video showing Combs assaulting Ventura in a hotel hallway was tied to one such incident. She claimed she tried to flee a "freak off" before her movie premiere but was beaten and left with a black eye. When asked how often he threw her to the ground,

she replied, "Too many to count."

Cassie and Combs ended their relationship in 2018. She is now married and appeared at trial visibly pregnant, supported by her husband in court.

The trial continues today with Ventura's cross-examination. Prosecutors must prove racketeering and sex trafficking charges. Combs, who has denied all allegations, faces life in prison if convicted.

It remains unclear if any witnesses from Turks and Caicos will be called to testify.

intent." The Ministry emphasized that neither the Minister nor any government agency is connected to the claims being circulated.

"This message was not sent out by the Minister nor is he in any way affiliated with this group or any services they claim to be offering," the statement read. "We strongly advise members of the public to avoid submitting any personal information or making payments to this website."

The fraudulent site not only exploited the Minister's name and likeness but also leveraged the brand of The Nassau Guardian, one of the country's oldest and most reputable newspapers, to boost credibility. The result was a dangerously convincing piece of disinformation that has since been flagged and removed — but not before circulating widely on social media.

Government officials are urging residents to report any suspicious links or ads they encounter and to be cautious of offers that require payment or the submission of sensitive personal information. The matter has been referred to the Royal Bahamas Police Force for further investigation.

The Ministry is also advising Bahamians who may have interacted with the scam to take immediate corrective action, including changing passwords and contacting their banks or relevant authorities.

"We encourage the public to remain vigilant and always verify information through official sources before taking any action," the Ministry urged.

This latest incident underscores the evolving sophistication of online scams in the region and highlights the importance of digital literacy and healthy skepticism when encountering sensational claims — particularly those promising unearned

Two 18 Year-Olds Cleared of Charges in Police Shooting case

Wednesday, May 14, 2025 – Turks and Caicos Islands Two 18-year-old men who had been accused of shooting at police and ramming a police vehicle in Kew Town, Providenciales, have been formally cleared of all charges and released from custody.

HE incident occurred on February 2, 2025, and left a tactical police officer seriously injured. The officer, who was briefly hospitalized, was unable to return to full duties for several weeks. Eagle Legal News has confirmed he is now on light duty as he continues his recovery.

The accused—Keaun Wilson and Jael Rigby—were arrested and charged with multiple firearm-related offenses. On March 4, they were remanded to His Majesty's Prison pending further legal proceedings. However, during a Sufficiency Hearing held on Friday, May 9, 2025,

However, during a Sufficiency Hearing held on Friday, May 9, 2025, the Honorable Chief Justice ruled that the evidence brought forth by law enforcement and the prosecution was insufficient to proceed to trial. As a result, both young men were discharged and released from cutodu.

This ruling effectively ends the case against the pair, who had faced serious allegations including assaulting law enforcement officers and use of a firearm during the commission of a crime.






Women-Led Organizations in Crisis: UN Warns of Widespread Shutdowns Amid Funding Cuts

A new report from UN Women, released this week, reveals a deepening crisis for women-led and women's rights organizations operating in some of the world's most fragile settings. Based on a global survey conducted in March 2025 that reached over 400 organizations across 44 countries, the findings paint a stark picture: 90% of respondents report that recent funding reductions have directly impacted their operations, and nearly half say they are at risk of shutting down within six months.

often on the front lines in conflict zones, disasterstricken areas, and regions of acute poverty—provide lifeline services to women and girls, including access to income support, food distribution, healthcare, legal aid, and safe spaces. The threat of closure is not only a setback for women's rights—it's a humanitarian



emergency in the making.

When women and girls lose access to these services, the risks escalate dramatically. Gender-

based violence, exploitation, early marriage, transactional sex, and unsafe migration become increasingly common coping strategies. The report highlights that marginalized groups—migrants, refugees, Indigenous women, older women, women with disabilities, and LGBTIQ+ individuals—will be the hardest hit. These communities already face barriers to accessing mainstream humanitarian aid and will now confront even greater exclusion and danger.

The funding cuts have also intensified competition, with 62% of surveyed organizations reporting a struggle to secure increasingly scarce resources. A staggering 77% predict a significant decline in the number of operational women's rights NGOs in the coming months. Yet despite the growing challenges, these organizations are not retreating.

In the face of adversity, womenled groups are demonstrating resilience and ingenuity. Many are pursuing new donors, diversifying funding streams, and engaging in strategic planning and advocacy. There's a mounting push for longterm sustainability models that reduce dependence on external funding and strengthen grassroots capacity.

Still, the need for urgent international support is clear. As crises multiply—from armed conflict to climate disasters—cutting off funding to women-led organizations risks silencing some of the most effective and trusted voices in humanitarian response.

As the UN warns, the global community must act swiftly to protect these organizations—not just for their sake, but for the countless women and girls they serve.

A Father's tears: **Grieving the Loss** of a Second Son to Gun Violence

Monday, 12 May 2025 - Turks and Caicos Islands

A family in Kew Town, Providenciales, is once again plunged into mourning after losing a second son to senseless gun violence-this time on the eve of Mother's Day

The victim, 33-year-old Cyrildo Smith, was socializing with a group of men outside an apartment complex in a quiet residential area when unknown gunmen opened fire just before midnight, Residents contacted Eagle Legal News, describing the sound of rapid gunfire from what they believed were high-caliber weapons.

Moments later, calls flooded in reporting a man lying motionless on the ground, while another nearby could be heard crying out in pain. When our news team arrived, the scene was heart-wrenching. Cyrildo's mother and relatives were already wailing in anguish. Despite police efforts to comfort her, the grieving mother insisted on seeing her son's body.

What she said next was chilling.

"This is my second child to be killed, and I've still heard nothing from you all (police) about my first child's murder over a year ago," she cried—referencing the Dragon Bar killings on Leeward Highway, 1 February 2024, in which her youngest son was one of the victims.

Her words echo a painful reality many families in the Turks and Caicos Islands know all too well: no updates, no closure, no justice.

Eventually, officers allowed the father to view his son's body, lying in a pool of blood. His grief was visceral. "He looked just like me," the father sobbed. "He was my favorite boy." The mother, overwhelmed, was supported by relatives as she collapsed in tears.

One of Cyrildo's brothers arrived on scene and had to be restrained by police. He broke through the police tape in anguish, crying:

"Leave me alone, man! That's my brother! This is the second time! Oh Lord, this hurt so much!'

The weight of the family's sorrow was ove

Out of respect, our crew stopped filming.

Cyrildo Smith was remembered by both parents as a quiet, respectful man who worked in the hospitality sector. He had lived at the family home all his life and had no criminal record. Though he struggled with alcohol after the death of his younger brother. his parents emphasized that he was never violent or involved in wrongdoing.

"This is unbelievable. Two of my boys... gone," the father said softly. "He was a decent child. Not caught up in foolishness"

Cyrildo reportedly had no children, but Eagle Legal News has received calls from individuals claiming a woman may be pregnant with his child.


If confirmed, yet another child in Turks and Caicos will grow up without a father.

Governor Calls for Bold, Community-Led Policing in Crime Fight

Providenciales, TCI - Governor Dileeni Daniel-Selvaratnam has issued a strong call for datadriven, intelligence-led and community-based policing to combat rising crime in the Turks and Caicos Islands. In remarks delivered at the recent swearingin of Commissioner Fitz Bailey, the Governor underscored the urgent need for reform. accountability and strategic collaboration across agencies and borders.

OUR response to crime must be strategic, data-driven, intelligenceled and collaborative—across agencies, across borders and above all, with the communities we serve," the Governor said, addressing law enforcement officers and regional dignitaries.

She warned that criminal networks are becoming more sophisticated, and that the TCI is at the "sharp end" of regional security threats. Against that backdrop, she outlined a vision for the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force as an institution rooted in fairness, strengthened

by public trust, and driven by results.
"We must be unforgiving in our zerotolerance approach to misconduct," she added, "Wearing the badge must continue to be a source of pride, not of power or privilege.

Governor Selvaratnam Commissioner Bailey for his record of modern, community-focused leadership and said his appointment marked a critical moment for the country's law enforcement strategy. While the ceremony took place two weeks ago, her words continue to resonate amid ongoing public concern about violent crime and border security.

Quoting from the Bible and invoking the moral arc of justice, the Governor emphasized that effective policing must be grounded in integrity, humility and

Police Investigate Fatal Shooting in Kew Town, Second Man also hit

Police in the Turks and Caicos Islands are investigating a double shooting that occurred late Saturday night, resulting in one fatality and one man injured.

According to a statement from the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force (RT&CIPF), the first shooting was reported around 11:12 p.m. on May 10 in the Kew Town area. Officers responded to gunshots heard near Harmony Close and discovered a man suffering from gunshot wounds at Cerasie Close. Emergency medical services were called, but the victim—identified as 33-year-old Cyrildo Smith of Kew Townwas pronounced dead at 12:16 a.m.

While securing the scene, police located a second man nearby who had also sustained injuries. He was transported to a medical facility for treatment. His condition was not disclosed in the statement.

Shortly after, at approximately 11:25 p.m., officers responded to a second



report of gunfire at Ralph Close in the Blue Hills area. There, they found a 20-year-old man inside a house with apparent gunshot wounds. He was also taken for medical treatment. Authorities did not release his name or details on his condition

Police have not confirmed whether

The 7 Habits of Happy Families; Stronger relationships, more laughter, and deeper connection—here's how.

As I have surveyed and worked with thousands of families over the years. there are a small handful of habits that I see parents practice that make their families happy. And they are astonishingly powerful.

N this article I will share those habits by describing the principle, discussing how it works in practice, and offering a provocation to get you thinking.

1. Assume Positive Intent

Principle: Your children are not actually trying to ruin your life. They're trying their best with limited skills and resources. Sometimes they can be clumsy. They only have their

In Practice: When your child does something upsetting, pause before reacting. Ask yourself, "What need is my child trying to meet?" Then, address the need rather than just the behaviour. "I can see you're frustrated. Let's figure this out

Provocation: We wouldn't assume your colleague intentionally sabotaged a project, yet we're quick to believe our children orchestrating psychological warfare against us. Your child isn't a criminal mastermind plotting your demise. They're just hungry, tired, or struggling to communicate. The fastest way to turn a good kid bad is

to treat them like they already are.

2. Laugh Together Principle: Shared joy creates bonds that withstand life's challenges.

In Practice: Have family movie nights with comedies. Share funny stories. Play ridiculous games. Create inside jokes. Laugh at yourself when you make mistakes. Make silly faces, tell dad jokes, and celebrate the ridiculous moments of family life.

Provocation: Most families spend more time coordinating schedules than creating memories. The average household shares fewer than 20 minutes of laughter per week, yet we wonder why everyone feels disconnected. If your family hasn't had a proper belly laugh together in the last few days, your family culture is in critical condition.

3. Fix Things Fast

Principle: Conflict is inevitable; prolonged disconnection is optional. In Practice: Be the first to

apologise, especially if you're the parent. Name what went wrong. Take responsibility for your part. Ask what would help. End with physical connection. A hug, high five, or fist bump resets everyone's nervous

Provocation: Your silent treatment isn't "teaching them a lesson". Nor is velling or threatening. It's teaching them that love is conditional. Every hour of unresolved tension between you and your child is rewiring their brain to expect conditional acceptance in future relationships. Your pride isn't worth the therapy bills they'll have later.

4. Stay Close Principle: Children of all ages are biologically wired for connection with their parents.

In Practice: Create daily rituals of connection: bedtime stories. morning cuddles, after-school checkins. Sit on their bed for five minutes at night. Drive them to school when possible. Find small ways to connect throughout the day that show you're thinking of them.

Provocation: Your child's push for independence is a façade. Behind a child desperately hoping you won't believe the act. While vou're respecting their "independence" by backing off, they're interpreting your distance as abandonment. Your children need you more, not less – they just need you differently as they grow. They want your involvement in a supportive, not a controlling way.

5. Listen Fully

security and builds trust.

In Practice: Put down your phone when your child speaks. Make eye contact. Ask follow-up questions. Reflect back what you hear. Don't immediately jump to solutions or lectures. Sometimes say, "Tell me more about that."

Provocation: If your screen time report shows more hours on social media than minutes of eye contact with your children, you're outsourcing the most important relationship they have right now to someone or something else. Your child will remember exactly zero of your "important" emails or Instagram reels, but they'll never forget the times you chose your phone over their story.

6. Create Meaningful Traditions Principle: Family Principle: Being heard creates create stability and identity in an

In Practice: Establish weekly family nights, seasonal celebrations, birthday traditions, or Sunday dinners. They don't need to be consistency matters more than complexity. Even simple traditions like Sunday morning anchors create pancakes belonging.

Provocation: In a culture where kids construct identity through screens and peers, your family traditions are fighting for your children's sense of self. Without these shared experiences, your family becomes little more than roommates who occasionally share Wi-Fi. The traditions you neglect creating today are the memories your children won't have tomorrow.

7. Have the Hard Conversations Principle: Children need parents who are brave enough to discuss difficult topics.

In Practice: Create an environment where no question is off-limits. Talk about bodies, relationships, disappointments, and fears in ageappropriate ways. Don't wait for the "perfect moment". Use everyday opportunities to address important topics briefly and naturally.

Provocation: Your discomfort with difficult conversations doesn't make them unnecessary. It makes them urgent. The conversations you avoid having with your children will be filled by Google, YouTube, or the kid on the bus with wildly inaccurate information. If you won't have these conversations, someone else - or something else -will, and you probably won't like their curriculum



Fleming Fund projects launched with CARPHA, UKHSA and PAHO to fortify the Caribbean's fight against Antimicrobial Resistance

On Monday, 5 May 2025, health leaders, development partners and regional stakeholders gathered at the Hilton Barbados Resort to launch two synergistic, landmark, regional projects under the United Kingdom (UK) Government's Fleming Fund and jointly implemented by the Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA), the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), and the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA). The goal is to strengthen the Caribbean's ability to combat the global crisis of antimicrobial resistance (AMR).

AMR occurs when microbes evolve to resist treatment, making infections harder to cure. In 2019, AMR caused 1.27 million deaths and contributed to nearly five million more—surpassing HIV/ AIDS and malaria. Caribbean small island and developing states face added risks due to limited lab infrastructure, transport delays, and uneven access to antibiotics. The project, 'Strengthening Antimicrobial Resistance Response in the Caribbean', led by PAHO is designed to upgrade microbiology laboratories in ten countries (Belize, Dominica, Grenada, Guyana, Haiti, Jamaica, Saint Lucia, Saint Vincent and the Grenadines, Suriname, and Montserrat). It will also enhance capacity at the Best-dos-Santos Public Health Laboratory in Barbados.

The Caribbean Antimicrobial Resistance Alliance (CARA),

partnership between UKHSA and CARPHA, forms part of CARPHA's wider integrated AMR Programme aimed at enhancing the region's capacity to detect and respond antimicrobial resistance. Through this initiative, CARPHA is strengthening its regional laboratory network, expanding diagnostic capabilities, and improving the collection and use of AMR data. The project will support Member States by expanding reference laboratory services in Trinidad and Tobago, and Saint Lucia, establishing a digital, region-wide surveillance platform. CARA also promotes regional coordination and best practice sharing, helping to align national efforts and policies to ensure timely, data-informed responses to antimicrobial resistance.

Speaking in support of the launch, Professor Dame Sally Davies, UK Special Envoy on Antimicrobial Resistance noted that AMR is a global emergency that demands urgent action. "The collaboration between UKHSA and CARPHA, supported by the Fleming Fund, is a powerful testament to our shared commitment to tackling this crisis head-on. By enhancing lab capabilities, improving surveillance, and building workforce expertise, we are taking decisive steps to protect the health of Caribbean communities and beyond. Together, we can make a lasting impact in the fight against



Ashley Dalton, Minister of State for Public Health and Prevention (UK Department of Health and Social highlighted "Antimicrobial resistance is one of the most serious and complex health challenges facing our world. The government is combating AMR through the Fleming Fund and advancing our national action plan, development models and surveillance systems. Our partnerships with the Caribbean Public

Health Agency and Pan American Health Organisation are a vital for safeguarding public health and ensuring the effectiveness of life-saving treatments for future

Dr Natalie Wright, Head of UK Overseas Territories Programme and CARA project lead at UKHSA said: "AMR is an urgent global public health and development threat. affecting all countries and regions. Sustained action is required to curb inappropriate use of antibiotics, the main driver of AMR. "Through this programme our goal is to build sustainable systems that promote data sharing, support decision-making, and create lasting resilience to the threat of AMR. The work we do today will lay the foundation for a healthier, more secure future."



National Reference Lab being restored and strengthened to ensure quality and reliability of health data and early warnings of health threats

NASSAU, The Bahamas -- In an effort to strengthen the public health system in the country, the Ministry of Health and Wellness and the Inter-American Development Bank facilitated the signing of an estimated \$2 million contract for the National Reference Laboratory.

HE contract signing ceremony was held during a press conference at the Ministry of Health and Wellness on Meeting Street on Monday, May 5, 2025.

The agreement was entered into with Scorpio Construction Ltd., following a competitive bidding process. The project is being carried out in partnership with the IDB for Health System Strengthening.

"Today marks an important milestone for my ministry's ongoing efforts to strengthen the public health system of The Bahamas," said Minister of Health and Wellness the Hon. Dr. Michael Darville.

The reference lab will be located at the former Mortgage Corporation Building on Russell Road in Oakes Field and will provide accessible services in New Providence.

Dr. Darville pointed out that in the aftermath of Hurricane Dorian in 2019, healthcare facilities sustained an estimated \$37.7 million in damage.

With construction of new ones, and renovations to healthcare facilities throughout the country, the ministry is focusing on three main



areas:

resilience to natural disasters; sustainability and energy efficient design incorporating EDGE "green building" certification; and adequate design for infectious diseases.

Joana Pascual, IDB Group Chief of Operations/The Bahamas underscored the importance of IDB's support in such undertakings. "The health programme is an important aspect of the IDB's portfolio in The Bahamas," she said.

Through two investment loans, one non-reimbursable grant, and one non-reimbursable technical cooperation totalling approximately \$65 million, she said that the bank is pleased to support the Government of The Bahamas and The Ministry of Health.

"Through the Health Systems Strengthening Programme of The Bahamas, we will finance renovations to the National Reference Lab (NRL)," she said.

And added, "While labs are essential to providing diagnostic information -- data on the efficacy of treatment plans, indications of improvements in patient outcomes,

early warnings of public health threats -- the National Reference Lab is the central mechanism for ensuring quality and reliability of those results."

Signatories to the contract were Colin Higgs, Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Health and Wellness and representative, Scorpio Construction Ltd.

CABINET APPROVES UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE BENEFIT FOR NIS CONTRIBUTORS

KINGSTON, May 14 (JIS):

Cabinet has approved the introduction of the unemployment insurance benefit, which will be added to the suite of provisions under the National Insurance Scheme (NIS).

The new benefit will serve as a guaranteed safety net for all employees who contribute to the NIS, except for self-employed persons.

Additionally, work is under way to establish the requisite legal and institutional frameworks to implement this important national support system.

"One of the key lessons from the COVID-19 pandemic is the urgent need for a system that supports workers who lose their jobs, helping them to remain financially stable while seeking re-employment," Minister of Labour and Social Security, Hon. Pearnel Charles Jr., said during his 2025/26 Sectoral Debate presentation in the House of Representatives on Tuesday (May 13).

Meanwhile, the Government has taken a decisive step to strengthen the nation's social security framework by implementing the Social Protection for Increased Resilience and Opportunity (SPIRO), a US\$20-million initiative supported by the World Bank.

Non-profit seeking corporate and community support to close financing gap for country's newest national park

BNT to Host Fundraiser for Seahorse National Park in Eleuthera

May 12, 2025 - Nassau, Bahamas

The Bahamas National Trust (BNT) is seeking to close the financing gap for the initial development of the country's newest national park by hosting a fundraiser in Eleuthera on May 28.

Officially declared on September 7, 2023 after nearly a decade of outreach and petitioning, Seahorse National Park (SNP) at Sweetings Pond and Hatchet Bay Caves in Eleuthera protects what is believed to be the densest population of seahorses in the world. It also protects the historic Hatchet Bay Cave - one of the longest cave systems in The Rahamas

This latest addition to The Bahamas' national park system has the potential to become a world-renowned national park and a blueprint for sustainable recreation and tourism. To date, advancement activities have been funded through the success of the BNT's 2024 Pig Roast event, which raised \$162,000 towards the \$500,000 estimated to be needed to facilitate the park's initial development.

These activities have included purchasing and installing a mobile structure to act as the BNT's temporary park office; clearing pathways and areas for trails and parking; and installing gates.

The next steps, according to BNT Director of Parks Ellsworth Weir, are to purchase and install solar panels, install running water, and pave the parking area.

"We've made a lot of headway since last year and you can definitely see the progress," said Weir. "There's been a lot of work done, but we just need to get to the finish line. Right now it all comes down to funding. That's where this fundraiser comes in."

The Seahorse National Park Fundraiser will be a cocktail event held in Governor's Harbour, Eleuthera at the Buccaneer Club on May 28, 2025. Tickets are \$125 per person and can be purchased online at www.bntevents. com or in person at the Buccaneer Club. Attendees will enjoy live music, a silent auction with incredible prizes, an open bar, and hors d'oeuvres.

The public can participate in the special auction by bidding on incredible items like Bahamian artwork,

Technological Skills Take Center Stage in Future of Jobs Report

The World Economic Forum's
Future of Jobs Report 2025
reveals a sharp pivot in
employer expectations toward
technological and human-centric
skills. Over the next five years, Al
and big data are forecast to see
the fastest growth in importance,
underscoring the rapid digital
transformation reshaping global
industries. Following closely are
networks and cybersecurity,
along with a general rise in
demand for technological
literacy.

OWEVER, it's not just technical skills gaining traction. Employers are placing increasing value on creative thinking, as

well as socio-emotional strengths like resilience, flexibility, agility, curiosity, and a commitment to lifelong learning. These competencies reflect a growing need for workers who can adapt quickly, think critically, and remain engaged amid

Also ascending in importance are leadership and social influence, talent management, analytical thinking, and environmental stewardship. These skills point to a future workforce that must not only manage innovation but also guide teams through complex transitions, including those driven by sustainability imperatives.

In contrast, traditional cognitive and physical skills are showing signs of decline. Reading, writing, and mathematics are projected to see a small net decrease in relevance. More notably, manual dexterity, endurance, and precision—long staples of many industrial roles — are expected to drop significantly in value, with over 24% of employers anticipating reduced importance. This marks a historic low for these physical abilities, which

have consistently trended downward in previous reports but now show a net negative shift.

Sector-specific insights highlight how the demand for AI and big data is near-universal, with more than 90% of top industry respondents forecasting increased use, except in Agriculture, Forestry, and Fishing (70%) and the Accommodation, Food, and Leisure sector (69%). Resilience and adaptability are especially vital in traditionally less tech-centric industries, while creative thinking is surging in importance in Insurance, Education, and Telecommunications.

Environmental stewardship is also gaining ground, particularly in Oil and Gas and Chemicals, reflecting broader sustainability goals. Meanwhile, physical skills are declining most in Energy, Chemicals, and IT Services, with decreases above 39%.

Overall, the report paints a clear picture: the future workforce must combine digital fluency with adaptive, human-centered skills to thrive in a rapidly evolving inb landscape.

Martinique Showcases Unique Cruise Appeal and Growing Accessibility at Cruise360

FOR LAUDERDALE, FL (May 11, 2025) – The Martinique Tourism Authority delivered a compelling case for the French Caribbean island's expanding cruise market during a well-attended morning session at Cruise360, held at the Greater Fort Lauderdale/Broward County Convention Center last month.

Led by a seasoned trio of tourism professionals, the presentation — themed "Sail Away to Martinique's Hidden Treasures" — highlighted the island's cultural richness, port diversity, and increasing accessibility by air and sea. The seminar was held in collaboration with American Airlines and targeted travel advisors and cruise industry stakeholders eager to tap into new and enriching Caribbean experiences for their clients.

Muriel Wiltord, Director of the Americas at the Martinique Tourism Authority (MTA), whose decades-long leadership has been pivotal in shaping the island's North American outreach, underscored the strategic importance of airlift in growing Martinique's homeport capabilities. Pointing to robust connections through Miami, she stated: "The accessibility of Martinique from the United States is facilitated by American Airlines, providing seamless travel options between Fort-de-France and Miami, with convenient connections at Miami International Airport."

Monique Macaire-Sprott, MTA's U.S. Manager for Marketing, Administration, Cruise & Water Sports, offered a detailed overview of Martinique's visitor experience. She spotlighted the island's UNESCO biosphere reserve designation, iconic sites like Mount Pelée, and Creole cultural traditions.

Macaire-Sprott emphasized Martinique's wide array of accommodations — including a renovated Club Med, boutique hotels, luxury villas, eco lodges, and transparent "bubble" hotels — and spoke to the island's investments in accessibility, including electric transport for mobility-impaired cruise passengers. "We make sure that if you have clients who have wheelchairs or who have problems walking, we have electric vehicles that will come at the gangway to meet with them if they need to," she explained.

Cruise industry veteran Roger Blum, serving as Martinique's cruise tourism consultant, focused on the island's impressive maritime infrastructure. "For an island of its size, Martinique actually has eight unique cruise ports. Two of them (Pointe Simon and Les Tourelles in Fort-de-France) are where the biggest ships in the world can dock, and the other six of them are unique, different types of boutique anchorages that really cater to the smaller luxury and ultra-luxury ships."

He guided attendees through Martinique's range of prevent experiences, from the historic city of Saint-Pierre in the north to the yachting hub of Le Marin in the south, and shared insights on the growing number of luxury lines including The Ritz-Carlton Yacht Collection, Seabourn, Regent, Silversea, and Oceania that now include Martinique in their itineraries.

The presentation also featured Glenn Heilbron, Channel Sales Manager with American Airlines, who discussed the airline's nonstop Miami–Fort-de-France service and its alignment with cruise itineraries. "Passengers can travel by air into the island and then take a cruise there and backwards also," he noted, emphasizing seamless connectivity across U.S. gateways.

Attendees received curated destination materials and were invited to engage further with Martinique's offerings on the trade show floor. The session ended with a call to action: embrace Martinique's trade tools and specialist program to unlock a hidden gem on the Caribbean cruise map.

13 Guadeloupean Students Visit Dominica to Deepen Understanding of Kalinago History and Culture

Roseau, Dominica – Thirteen secondyear high school students from Maison Familiale Rurale Education Orientation Lamentin (MFR Lamentin) in Guadeloupe have arrived in Dominica for a five-day educational exchange focused on the Kalinago people—Dominica's Indigenous community. The initiative forms part of their Caribbean history curriculum and aims to foster deeper understanding and appreciation of the region's rich and often overlooked Indigenous heritage.

This immersive experience, coordinated by Black Island Girl Multimedia, is designed to educate students on the Kalinago people's contributions, traditions, and resilience, both past and present. By bringing students directly into contact with the Kalinago Territory, this program seeks to reshape the way Caribbean history is taught, centering authentic narratives and challenging historically inaccurate portrayals.

During their stay, students will engage with several cultural leaders including:

• Apatta Sanford Dominica's first

- Anette Sanford, Dominica's first female Kalinago Chief
- Hon. Cozier Frederick, Minister for Environment, Rural Modernisation, Kalinago Upliftment, and Constituency Empowerment
- Earlson Matthew, Chief Cultural Officer of Dominica

The itinerary also includes serval heritage sites and cultural experiences. They will participate in a traditional Kalinago naming ceremony, culinary experiences with locally made cassava and other traditional foods, and visits to



the Indian River, Fort Shirley, and Titou Gorge.

Educators from MFR Lamentin have extended a heartfelt invitation to members of the Kalinago community and cultural experts to meet with the visiting students. "We would be honoured if you could spare some time to engage with our students and share your perspectives on the significance of the Kalinago civilization in both historical and contemporary contexts," said Mahailiah Mellow, teacher and development officer from the delegation. "Your expertise and leadership would greatly enrich the students' understanding and appreciation of this vibrant and enduring culture."

This exchange not only represents a powerful educational moment but also contributes to the ongoing efforts to preserve and promote Kalinago heritage across the Caribbean.
